Committee positions have tremendous influence over shaping the direction of the party and over elections in New York. They:


- Elect party leadership; vote on party matters, like party rules
- Spearhead "get out the vote" and voter registration efforts
- Encourage voter conversion to the Republican party
- Amplify the voice of their neighbors on issues they care about
- Leverage their engagement with elected officials
- Help fill judicial vacancies on the Civil and Supreme Court
- Appoint poll watchers
- Help choose Republican nominees in state special elections
- Attend one to two party meetings each year.

Your Voice, Your Vote Matters!

The next Republican Party Election is scheduled for 2025.

<u>State Committee Members</u> are elected officials who serve unpaid twoyear terms. Elections take place every odd year. They are responsible for electing the State Party Chairperson. State Committee representatives are able to develop and lead Republicans in their Assembly District.

County Committee Members are elected officials who serve unpaid two-year terms. Elections take place every odd year. They are responsible for electing the County Party Chairperson. They are closest to the voter, present worthy policies and candidates for voter consideration, and provide feedback to the State Committee Members.

City Council • Public Advocate • City Comptroller • Mayor


- State Senate State Comptroller State Assembly

18 Assembly Districts (AD)

Represented by 36 State Committee Members (18 men and 18 women)


> There are approximately 60-100 Election Districts (ED) per Assembly District (AD)

1425 Election Districts (ED)


Represented by approximately 2850 County Committee Members; (Man or Woman)

4 Regions


Queens County is divided into 4 regions for better governance. These regions are not electoral precincts. Each region is presided over by an appointed County Vice Chair.



NEW YORK



The AD and ED maps are determined by the state legislature every ten years depending on the outcome of the U.S. Census report. As a result of the U.S. Census, the state legislature begins the redistricting process, changing the Congressional, State Senate and Assembly District maps which usually involves redrawing the boundaries possibly at all levels of government due to state outmigration.
